About Wisconsin Family Action's 2025-2026 Legislative Scorecard

Wisconsin Family Action (WFA) is pleased to present its *2025-2026 Legislative Scorecard*. This Scorecard covers the two-year legislative session our state legislators recently concluded, running from January 2025 through this spring.¹ This publication is a compilation of significant floor votes, committee votes, and author and co-sponsors on a cross-section of legislative proposals dealing in some way with marriage, family, the sanctity of human life, or religious freedom.

This *2025-2026 Legislative Scorecard* is a part of WFA's mission of strengthening, preserving, and promoting marriage, family, life, and religious freedom in the Badger State. We are working for a Wisconsin where God is honored, life is cherished, families thrive, and religious freedom flourishes.

Our mission and vision will happen only as individuals across the state become involved in their culture and their government. Holding elected officials accountable for their policy work is an extremely important part of good citizenship. We hope this information is helpful to you as you exercise your civic duty as a citizen of this state.

¹Technically, Wisconsin's legislative sessions run from early January in odd-numbered years through December 31 of even-numbered years. However, in practice, the second year of the two-year session typically finishes no later than early April as it relates to floor sessions. After that, the officials are involved in campaigns, and no floor periods for voting take place.



WFA Scoring Methodology

Specific legislative actions of each legislator are “scored” in comparison to Wisconsin Family Action’s (WFA) position on a bill. This year, in addition to a number of key floor votes, we have included select committee votes. Committee votes are important opportunities for elected officials to do the right thing on a given legislative proposal. In this edition, we have also included a few bills where we scored Author/Co-sponsors. We have appropriately noted the other bills where authors/co-sponsors were scored.

Legislators **are not penalized for opportunities they did not have**, such as not serving on a committee where a vote took place, or if they were excused from a floor session where a vote took place. In the Assembly, if a representative was not available to vote but “paired” his/her vote, we did consider those as indicators of the legislator’s publicly recorded position on the bill. **“Pairing”** is when two legislators not on the floor to vote, agree to inform leadership that one is a “yes” on a bill and the other is a “no.” Their “pairings” are not recorded as part of a roll-call vote and don’t count in the final vote tally but do show on the official roll-call sheet, noted as **“PAIRED.”**

This session legislators were dealing with a divided state government. While both the Senate and Assembly had Republican-versus-Democrat majorities (54-45 in the Assembly, 18-15 in the Senate), the governor is a Democrat with decidedly different positions on issues and markedly different priorities. This scenario resulted in bills being voted on and passed in both houses, with the governor vetoing a significant number of them. Important to remember, too, is that typically the majority leadership in both the Assembly and the Senate will not allow a bill to go to the floor unless they are sure they have the votes to pass it.

On particularly key bills that did not receive a roll call vote, we included author/co-sponsorship or committee votes on a bill to capture leanings. On one specific bill, AB 601, a voice vote was held in the Assembly. A bill of such consequence being voice voted was an attempt to avoid accountability for this specific vote. As such, we have scored all legislators voting as a yes on AB 601 unless it was expressly demonstrated that a legislator desired to be a no, such as recording their opposition in the legislative journal.

A **100% score** indicates the legislator agreed with WFA’s position on all scored items. We are especially grateful for legislators who have earned this distinctive achievement. These legislators are highlighted in **blue** on the Scorecard.

Finally, WFA cannot account for votes that did not happen because some legislators had the courage to oppose a bill, and thus prevented it from receiving a vote, often in the face of significant pressure, including sometimes from close colleagues. WFA thanks those legislators who stood for what was right this past session behind the scenes, preventing harmful bills from moving forward.

Explanation of Bills Scored
2025-2026 Legislative Session

AB 100 – Save Women’s Sports – K-12

Description: Assembly Bill 100 would prohibit biological male students from participating on all interscholastic, intramural, or club athletic teams or in sports designated for females and from using locker rooms designated for females for all K-12 school districts, independent charter schools, and choice private schools.

WFA Position: *Support*

Outcome: Passed in Senate and Assembly. Governor vetoed.

Scoring:

- Senate – Floor vote
- Assembly – Floor vote

AB 102– Save Women’s Sports – Higher Ed

Description: Assembly Bill 102 requires each University of Wisconsin institution and technical college to prohibit biological male students from participating on a team or in a sport designated for females, and to prohibit male students from using locker rooms designated for females.

WFA Position: *Support*

Outcome: Passed in Senate and Assembly. Governor vetoed.

Scoring:

- Senate – Floor vote
- Assembly – Floor vote

AB 104 – Heal Without Harm

Description: Assembly Bill 104 would prohibit health care providers from performing any surgical, hormonal, or cross-sex drug intervention on minors for the purpose of trying to “change” a minor’s biological sex.

WFA Position: *Support*

Outcome: Passed in Senate and Assembly. Governor vetoed.

Scoring:

- Senate – Floor vote
- Assembly – Floor vote

AB 105 – Keeping Kids Away from Pornography

Description: Assembly Bill 105 prohibits business entities from knowingly and intentionally publishing or distributing material harmful to minors (pornography) on the Internet from a website unless the business entity performs reasonable age-verification methods to verify the age of individuals attempting to access the website.

WFA Position: *Support*

Outcome: Passed in Senate on a voice vote (no individual votes recorded). Passed Assembly. Governor vetoed.

Scoring:

- Senate – Floor vote
- Assembly – Floor vote

SB 553 – Clarifying the Definition of Abortion

Description: Senate Bill 553 clarifies the definition of abortion by clearly stating that an abortion does not include a physician's performance of a medical procedure intended to prevent the death of a pregnant woman and not designed or intended to kill the unborn child. Medical procedure examples include an emergency induction, C-section, removal of miscarriage, ectopic, molar, or anembryonic pregnancies.

WFA Position: *Support*

Outcome: Passed in Senate. Passed committee in Assembly, but no floor vote.

Scoring:

- Senate – Floor vote
- Assembly – Author/Co-sponsor or Committee vote

AB 601 – Legalizing Online Sports Betting

Description: Assembly Bill 601 would amend Wisconsin’s gambling statutes by creating a new exception to the definition of “bet.” This change would effectively legalize mobile sports betting when conducted through tribal gaming operations under existing tribal–state agreements.

WFA Position: *Oppose*

Outcome: Passed in Senate. Passed in Assembly on a voice vote (no individual votes recorded). Governor signed.

Scoring:

- Assembly – Assembly Journal/Author/Co-sponsor/Committee vote

AB 602 – Education Freedom Tax Credit Program

Description: Assembly Bill 602 opts Wisconsin into a newly created federal program which provides a non-refundable federal tax credit of up to \$1,700 per individual per year for donations to qualified scholarship-granting organizations (SGOs). These organizations would award K-12 scholarships for tuition and other eligible education expenses to support public, charter, choice, private, or homeschool students.

Outcome: Passed in Senate and Assembly. Governor vetoed.

- Assembly – Floor vote

AJR 10 –Freedom to Worship During a State of Emergency

Description: Assembly Joint Resolution 54 would amend the state constitution to provide that the state or a political subdivision of the state may not order the closure of or forbid gatherings in places of worship in response to a state of emergency at the national, state, or local level.

WFA Position: *Support*

Outcome: Passed in Senate & Assembly. Placed on November 2026 ballot.

Scoring:

- Senate – Floor vote
- Assembly – Floor vote

AB 962 – App Store Accountability

Description: Assembly Bill 962 requires app stores to take appropriate steps in verifying the age of its consumers so that they do not engage in contracts with minors. The bill also directs app stores to obtain a parent’s authorization before an app is downloaded or a purchase is made.

WFA Position: *Support*

Outcome: Passed in Assembly. No further action.

Scoring:

- Senate – No action
- Assembly – Floor vote

AB 963 – Stopping Harms from Addictive Social Media

Description: Assembly Bill 963 requires social media platforms to estimate a new user’s age. If the new user is identified as a minor, the social media platform must acquire parental consent for continuation of the account. AB 963 also creates additional protections specific to social media accounts held by minors including setting the default privacy setting to maximum security, not allowing targeted commercial advertising, and prohibiting addictive features such as infinite scrolling.

Outcome: Passed in Assembly. No further action.

Scoring:

- Senate – No action
- Assembly – Floor vote
